

Proposed Changes to Resident Parking

Parts of Westbury Park, particularly areas close to Coldharbour Road and The Downs, suffer from parking problems by virtue of being on the edge of designated resident parking areas. Demand for parking in these areas comes not only from commuters but probably also from people living in resident parking areas who choose to park their cars, particularly second and third cars, outside the parking zones to avoid having to pay for a permit (a second permits costs £224, a third permit £560).

Recent proposals by the Council could increase the number of car owners living in resident parking areas parking their cars in parts of Westbury Park – an increase in the cost of a first permit from £56 to £178 and the removal of third parking permits. The Council are also considering reducing or even removing the number of visitor permits which might also impact areas on the edge of resident parking zones.

These controversial changes were agreed at a Cabinet meeting on 23rd January without any public consultation – a last throw of the dice by the Mayor before changes to governance in May with the return to the Committee structure. It remains to be seen whether the proposals agreed on 23rd January will be agreed and implemented by the Committee taking on responsibility for transport and parking after May 2024.
